THE ALTAR ROOM

Morse Code in Video

(A Rainy Sunday Afternoon Mystery)

This video was posted on Facebook by the Annapolis Heritage Society. When I was watching it I noticed that there was morse code in the music at around the the 3:55 mark. I tried to copy it but what i got didn't make sense in either French or English. Maybe some of you guys with better CW skills and better hearing can get some meaning out of it.

I agree with your conclusion, Dave. It makes sense in neither language, at least the easiest part to copy. If curiosity bugs me long enough, I may connect ear buds to this laptop and give it a better chance to explain itself.

The first two words being sent are "STOMIC SAKHALIN", as far as I can tell, and although the next words are very faint, I believe they are the first two words being repeated.

Don' make sense to me, either! 73 Mike, VE3GFN

Hello Dave, That's a very beautiful video of the Annapolis area. It kind of wants to make me take a tour there right now. In all my travels between here and Yarmouth, I've

missed too much even though I would have claimed to have seen it many times. Oakley made a very nice DVD video of the area a bit further west. It was taken by helicopter that he was flying at the time. Have you seen it? I have a copy around here somewhere.

You're right about the CW being hindered by the music. I may be able to enhance it by feeding the audio through my Timewave DSP filter and using its' 100 cycle bandwidth. It would be a bit of a chore right now, but perhaps later if no one else is able to decipher it completely. What I've made out thus far is:

"atomic Sakhalin atomic u kralin

That "u" above is actually the umlaut character ... a u with two dots above it. In Morse it is sent as: dit dit dah dah.

I also looked up both Milton Girouard (the Acadian) and Thomas Dolby (the music composer) on RAC website thinking either might be a Ham but no luck..

A nice video nonetheless. An interesting exercise on a rainy Sunday afternoon.


